

Dear Parents & Carers,

Believe it or not, another fortnight has passed since my last update – this is another fortnight closer to having all of our children back in school, which is what I know our whole school community want so desperately.

I know that many of our families are under a lot of pressure and that the 8th March (the date that the government are aiming to have children back in school) may feel really far away right now. However, there are a few messages that I would like to pass on to everyone who is working from home:

* We know that you may not be able to teach your child/ren as much as you would like to. This is okay. If you need to step away from school work every now and then, please do so. We understand.

* It's okay to not feel okay. This situation is tough for all of us and it is quite normal for us all to feel a bit sad. We are all missing normality and seeing friends and family when we would like to. But, if these 'not okay' feelings start to take over every day, please contact us. Our staff are here to listen and to help.

* As soon as it is safe to do so, we will be together as the SGFS family once again. We will then work hard to make sure that children get the support they need to achieve all that they are capable of. Try not to worry too much about gaps. We will address them as soon as we are able to.

Hang on in there just that little bit longer! We will get through this together, because that's what the SGFS school family do.

A few key messages to share with you all today...

Remote Learning Offer & Feedback

Thank you to all of the parents and carers who have commended us on our remote learning offer through positive comments and feedback. Your kind words of support really do mean a lot to us and they do motivate our staff, who are working so incredibly hard to ensure that they plan and deliver high quality, progressive lessons both in school and through home learning videos. I really am so very proud of what our staff have delivered and I believe that their sheer hard work and commitment is testament to what a strong offer we are able to provide for our children both at home and at school. We are planning to make a few exciting adaptations and refinements to things over the next week or so which we believe will really strengthen home learning provision for our families, whilst also supporting our staff and their work-life balance. We will also be sharing new expectations around feedback and the times when our teachers and support staff will be making comments on pupils' work – this is to avoid staff staying up until the early hours responding to uploaded work. More information will follow on this next week.

Numbers of Pupils in School

Last week, the DfE reported that there are 20% of primary aged children attending school nationally. However, at SGFS, we are now up to 42%. A few weeks back, I asked families to really carefully consider whether their children really needed to be in school. The guidance is quite clear now in stating that children of critical workers should be at home if any parents are working from home. I appreciate that some of you are working from home but cannot safely supervise your children because the nature of your work is highly confidential (eg attending virtual live court hearings or child protection conferences) and therefore you cannot safely look after your children. However, if you are able to work from home while keeping your children safe, then I would like to reiterate that you really should have your children at home with you. We know that working with children at home is very challenging but unfortunately this is not sufficient reason to request a school place. As well as the numbers already being high, we are still receiving requests for places from families where both parents and carers work for the NHS, or have been assigned to deliver the vaccination programme as well as many other genuine cases where parents have got to go out to work in critical roles in the community. We simply cannot turn these families away and so we need to create some additional capacity in school if at all possible. If your child is currently attending and you can look after them safely at home, please let us know immediately so that we can adjust our plans. It might be that your children are currently in full time and you can reduce this to part time - this too would help us enormously and is so important for our whole community. Thank you all in advance for your co-operation.

School Uniform

I thought that it was important to mention to all of our families now that from September, there will be a slight change to our school uniform. Please don't worry everyone – we will still have our beautiful, striking red sweatshirts and in essence, most things will remain the same. However, we will be making a slight change to the owl emblem which is embroidered on to the jumpers and polo shirts. The current owl design which is on our uniform was created many, many years ago by children who attended school at the time. As lovely and characterful as this owl is, we feel that this doesn't reflect our current branding any more, so we will be putting our stylish new owl (as seen in this letterhead) on the sweatshirts and t shirts in preparation for September 2021. I thought that it was useful to mention this to all of our families now in case anyone was thinking of buying any uniform in bulk for when we return to school after this lockdown – I would recommend holding off from doing this and perhap waiting until close to September when our new design will be introduced.

Lateral Flow Device Testing

This week, the majority of our staff in school have started to take part in twice weekly lateral flow testing for COVID-19. I believe that this is a really positive step from the government as it enables us to clearly identify any staff members who are asymptomatic but may in fact have COVID-19 which is therefore transmissible to other members of our school community and to our pupils. I hope that this really will help to keep our school family as safe as possible.

Thanks to our staff, who have all been following government guidelines really carefully, we have not yet had a positive test result. However, if any staff do test positive from their LFD test (which is then confirmed by a PCR test), this does mean that they would need to self-isolate for the specified period of 10 days (or 10 days from when their symptoms start if they ever get them), alongside any other staff or pupils who were in their class bubble. Whilst I hope that this never happens, I felt that it was important to inform all of our families about this so that everyone is fully informed in the event that we do receive a positive result.

'Windows of Hope'

A number of schools across the city are taking part in a lovely initiative called 'Windows of Hope'. The idea is that families will put up some colourful pieces of art in the windows of their houses which will share a message of hope and joy for Spring. 
